Guidelines should be tailored to local needs and conditions but many of the recommendations will be useful in the development of guidelines elsewhere. | Clinical Guidelines and a systematic review on early skin-to- skin care for term infants and low birth weight infants and their mothers Rintaro Mori <u>Abstract 5</u> | There is inconclusive evidence for effectiveness of early initiation of skin- to-skin contact in stable LBW babies, although some benefits are reported from individual studies. There is need to conduct a high quality muticentric randomized trial in different settings. |

| Continuous KMC from birth in a Swedish Neonatal Unit Kerstin Hedberg Abstract 10 Version of the second seco | Also in Sweden, a western industrialized country, mothers and fathers appear to accept the complete KMC method with early, continuous, prolonges STS contact, exclusive breastfeeding, early discharge and adequate follow up. The documentation of STS was incomplete, possibly because nurses did not regard the method as a medical treatment. Parent's perception of the method and infant outcome variables need to be further explored in prospective studies. |
